UTC-1 // 10:00 BRT - Sao Paolo, Brazil (Portuguese)

Our first World Future Day: Young Voices event focused on the future of education from the perspectives of four protagonists of the future concentrating their efforts on technology, science, mathematics, and entrepreneurship. Kids discussed the past, present and future of education and created a manifesto of their ideas. The event was guided by three core questions:

- 1) What is happening today in education?
- 2) What do you think may happen in the next ten years?
- 3) What do you want to happen and what are you already doing to make that future happen?

UTC-4 // 16:00 CET - Netherlands, Spain, Belgium (English)

We enjoyed an insightful discussion on WFD Young Voices in Europe, with youngsters from the Netherlands, Belgium, Spain, Greece, Germany and Romania, aged 11 to 24.

During the session, we learned about the project "KinderTrendrede" and the different demands of young people for the future of the city of Breda. Like the desire to integrate more nature in the city, start a no-more-bully group or include more young voices in the decision-making process, collaborating and working together. They referred to amongst others their advices <u>KinderTrendrede</u> 2018 and make sure there is much more green and climbing forests in Breda. No stones. Nature is important and KinderTrendrede 2020 wanted to 'start a no-more-bully group' in Breda.

We also heard young voices from Seville, from the **school San Francisco de Paula**, where they are currently following future classes. Sharing interesting thoughts about new innovative technologies applied to their city, like flying taxis that are already being tested in Spain and other countries.

The students from **VIVES University of Applied Sciences** shared their website project <u>www.unforseeable.org</u> that has the objective to be a tool for young people to learn and reflect about the future.

Together, we learned that we can't think about the future if we don't take care of basic needs first, for us humans, and also for the planet, like good health, wellbeing, clean water and sanitation. And that when people, countries and communities come together, listen to each other with an open mind, we can come to better solutions.

"We need to have different perspectives on issues, stay critical about various topics because I think that's a very important thing - that we don't have a tunnel vision." ~ Simon (Age?)




"We need to understand what is going to happen in the future. I imagine flying cars in the future, helping with better mobilization and transportation." ~ Nicolás 11 yr old













When you think about the future, what do you think about?





UTC-5 // 09:00 EST - Washington, USA (English)

The discussion covered The 15 World Challenges by the Millennium project and The Future of Work in Your Community and students engaged in a Whole System Collaboration and Change activity. In attendance were 42 high school and first-year college students representing four countries: the United States, the United Kingdom, Switzerland, and Canada.

Students were introduced to systems and wicked problems, they were introduced to each of the 15 Global Challenges. Next, students were organized into an organizational community and learned about it's system and a work role within the system. The students were assigned community roles and each community faced one or more of the 15 World Challenges.

The community members were introduced to whole system collaboration and change with an eight-stage process to build sustainable change in a community.





Finally, students were presented with joining Business Model Youth in 2021 September to begin working towards World Future Day 2022.

UTC-6 // 12:00 CST - Mexico City, Mexico (Spanish)

What a delightful conversation listening to Latin American children imagining their future in the year 2030. The youth ranged from 6 - 25 years old and they broadcasted all the way from Mexico to Columbia and Peru! We were able to appreciate interesting points of views on topics such as climate change, economic entrepreneurship and social inclusion.

Each student gave a mini presentation on the topic of their choice where they stated 5 . Topics ranged from social change, diversity equity and inclusion education, climate change regarding saving our animals habitats, alternative energy modalities, and mental health awareness. The takeaway advice given by the youth is that they all care about the future and their relationships with others, in turn it is everyone's duty to take care of the environment we share and live in.

The participants expressed ideas on how to achieve positive changes in the future. Something that could stimulate the development of activities like this would be the realization of creative visualization workshops as well as divergent thinking.

UTC-9 // 15:00 CST - Houston, USA (English)

This session involved young people from the Eastern and Central time zones of the U.S. and Canada. Each student brought in their topic of the future, how they think they can help shape this future themselves and which influential person could help them.

Topics ranged from education, health, hunger, the environment, governance, and technology, all revolving around the <u>UN SDGs</u>.

UTC-11 // 15:00 PST - San Francisco, USA (English)

In this session, we explored how some new emerging mult- or cross-disciplinary areas of study and work might be applied to dealing with some of the Millennium Project's 15 Global Challenges.

The session began by looking back at projects from 2009-2010 of a major study by the

Institute for the Future, called Future Work Skills: 2020

Six major drivers for future work skills were included: Extreme Longevity, Computational World, Super-Structured Organizations, Rise of Smart Machines and Systems, New Media Ecology, Globally Connected World. We focused mostly on "rise of smart machines & systems", the major growth of Al and machine learning over the past decade, as well as increasing aging populations of those living into their 90's and beyond- and how both of these might relate to some of the MP's 15 Global Challenges

We then looked at an exercise that crosses a number of adjectives with different traditional college majors or areas of study, like astro, digital, micro, nano, narrative, genomic, socio, bio-evolutionary, artistic and more.

World Future Day is an annual event initiated by Humanity+ and the Millennium Project in 2013. They organize a **24-hour online worldwide conversation** during this day where grown-ups discuss the future. The Millennium Project, a global foresight participatory think tank, will host this conversation for adults on the future in collaboration with the Association of Professional Futurists (APF), Humanity+, UNESCO's Global Futures Literacy Network, the World Academy of Art and Science (WAAS), and the World Futures Studies Federation (WFSF).

Teach the Future is a global movement that **promotes futures literacy** for students and educators. Their aspiration is that every young person is prepared to navigate an uncertain world and has the agency to imagine and create their preferred future. They do this by teaching futures-thinking skills to students and educators around the world and to inspire them to influence their futures.

Our main inspirator and partner is <u>The Millennium Project</u>. And ofcourse, all our **partners from all over the world** that support young people and their future. <u>Colegio Internacional de Sevilla -SFP</u>, <u>KinderTrendrede Team</u>, <u>DesignWorlds for College and Careers</u>, <u>Future Problem Solving Program International</u>, <u>Young Fusion Elders</u>, <u>Business Model Youth</u> and more (see this <u>link</u>).
